100+ Community Volunteers clean-up Gulf Harbour Country Club's abandoned Golf Course

A community-led initiative to mow the entire Gulf Harbour Country Club (GHCC) with a small team of helpers and support from local businesses got underway on Monday 21 October. On Sundays the 3rd and 10th of November a group of approximately 100 volunteers in total gathered on the golf course and undertook a major cleanup of the grounds. The following is a video showing the substantial impact the second volunteer day made. KWGS is not directly involved in this initiative but have played a supporting role to enable the team of mowers to get an action plan drawn up, gather resources to get volunteers on-board and

devise a comprehensive clean-up plan and move towards establishing a "Gulf Harbour Community Trust" to run these initiatives. We are also collecting donations for the mowers' operational expenses on behalf of the mower team at the point. The Trust will have its own banking arrangements in the New Year. Upcoming Trip

December 6th (Friday). Two-hour, Jane Gifford Charter Cruise from Warkworth.

We will travel to Warkworth on the free bus from Silverdale, or in your own car. Do not forget your AT HOP card if travelling by bus.

The bus stops close to the river wharf where the boat awaits us. We board the boat at about 11.30am and sail down the Mahurangi River into the estuary near Snells Beach.

We can each bring our own picnic and drinks, beer, wine etc. to have lunch on board the boat, during our two-hour cruise.

The bus from Hibiscus Coast Station leaves at 9.20 and 10.20 and takes about 30 minutes. The bus stops in Warkworth outside the Masonic Hall, near the Tourist Information/library building and the toilets are at the rear of this building.

We will meet at the boat wharf (just behind the above buildings) at 11.15.

If you prefer to drive to Warkworth that is fine, just let Steve know of your plans.

All are welcome, including friends.

If going by bus the service is the number 995 and leaves from stop B at HC. Station. Each bus holds about thirty-six passengers and normally there are few regular users. Either get an early bus at 9.20 or the later one at 10.20. The latest timetable shows buses leaving HCS at 9.20, 9.50 and 10.20, though I personally am not sure about the 9.50 one but give it a go if you wish. Get off the bus at the last stop in the middle of the town centre at the Masonic Hall.



The return bus, according to the timetable (dated 9th September 2024) is at 13.45, 14.15, 14.45 etc. And leaves at the stop you got off on Percy St.

Places are now limited, so if you wish to be included, book and pay now.

Speaker's corner



Club Speaker: for November was Brian Tracey. Brian was born in Auckland, but his parents were missionaries, so the family soon left for Nigeria. Starting in Lagos to learn the language the family moved to Egosi where his father became a dentist. Brian grew up spending 3 years in Nigeria and 1 year back in New Zealand raising money to go back and continue the missionary work. They then moved to Jos in the Nigerian highlands but had constant problems with dust storms from the Sahara. He attended a Boarding School for missionary children set up for an American education system. Growing up was much like New Zealand children except the trees and food were different. He went on trips around Nigeria with his dad as a dentist, but the roads were a little dangerous with booby traps (large holes in the road) to stop travellers.

Brian was back in New Zealand for his bursary exams to finish his schooling. The family moved to Kenya and undertook relief work into Southern Sudan. Brian became a tour guide in the Nairobi National Park. He married a medical student and went to northern Thailand for aid work where he learnt to use bamboo for everything. Obtaining a science degree from Waikato University then back to Nairobi where he was close to gunshots from a coup attempt while picnicking in a park.

On returning to New Zealand, he gained a degree in geohydrology and a job at GCNZ, then Tonkin and Taylor and then his own geotechnical data business working in water supply. He is now retired.



Guest Speaker Our Guest Speaker Geoff Cooper was introduced by Bruce Reddell. Geoff told us about his life as a pilot. His father was in the Air Force during WW2 and, after an accident while an electrician, became involved with Rex Aviation. This gave Geoff his introduction and desire to become a pilot as well as an airframe mechanic. In 1967 he became a cadet with Squadron 3 working at Whenuapai and where he applied for a pilot licence. On being accepted for training, he was transferred to

Wigram and flew Harvards and Devons. In 1973 he transferred to Ohakea and to No42 Squadron where he spent a lot of hours flying DC-3s, often doing 39 – 43 days flying in a row. In 1979 he joined Air NZ flying 25000 hours in 737s, 767s, 777s, and 747s but his love was the DC-3 [or Dakota]. There are only a few left flying in the world (140) today and Geoff's firm, Fly DC3, after the 80th anniversary of the DC-3 in NZ, had to close down as covid caused a loss of clients using it as well as losing pilots and ground crew. There were also problems with the engine which needs to be repaired in California. Their firm operated out of Ardmore Airport in South Auckland and was used for sightseeing flights around Auckland. The plane had been used to fly personnel in the US Army Air Force, then operated out of Korea and the Philippines. Later she moved to Papua New Guinea and Queensland Australia where she ended up in the Mackay Air Museum. A NZ Warbirds syndicate successfully purchased the plane for \$72,000 in 1987. Since this date she gained her own Airline Operating Certificate, flew 43,000 hours until 28th April 2024. She is now for sale and is likely to head back to Australia. Geoff also flew the Catalina, but the Chief Engineer died, and it has not been used since. Geoff gave a very interesting talk along with photos of their DC-3. Riley Bell thanked Geoff for his informative presentation.
