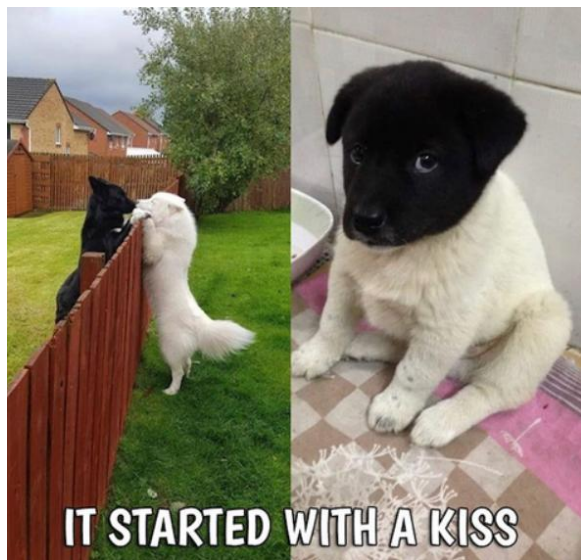

Due to the AGM, we did not have a March Club Speaker.

Club Speaker:



Our Guest Speaker was yachting legend Harold Bennett, introduced by Frank Coggan. Harold started off by telling us he had addressed our Club on a previous occasion on the America's Cup in San Francisco.

He is now the Vice Commodore at the Manly Sailing Club heading up the racing and training programmes. The club has a number of young champions coming through the programme and recently the club hosted the Foiling Moth World Championships which was won by Mattias Coutts, and the runner-up was Jake Pye both local club members having come through the training programme.

It took two years to organise. First year planning, second year putting it into action. The most difficult part was waiting for permission from the Auckland Council to get underway.

They used the park across the road as there were 100 boats and were thankful that Traffic from

South Auckland did the traffic management for free. The budget was \$230,000 mainly raised through sponsorship from local firms in the boating industry.

There were 13 nations represented, 76 competitors, 20 from New Zealand. Foiling Moths are expensive - \$110,000 to set up with foils ranging from \$6,000 to \$18,000 each. Each race is approximately 15 minutes long with the competitors exhausted at the end of a race.

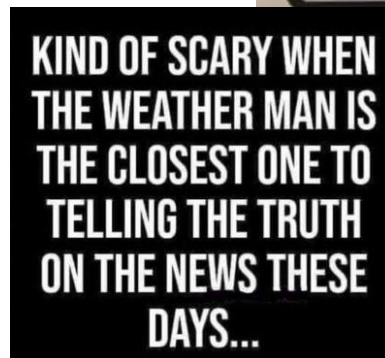
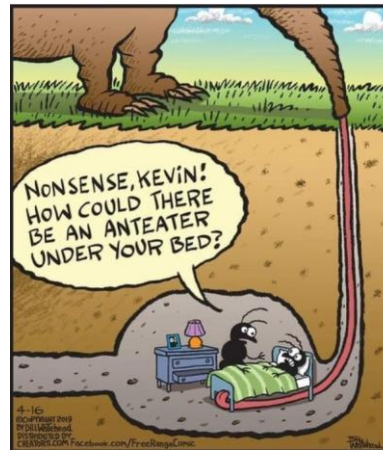
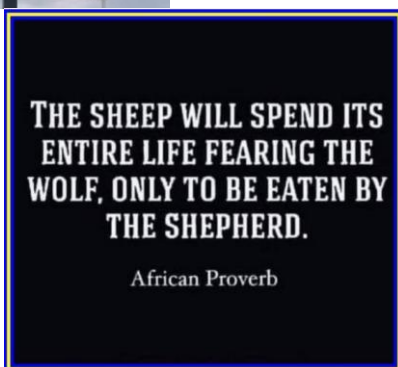
The two main problems faced by the sailors were the sharks they kept hitting and breaking equipment and the injuries resulting from falls at speeds of up to 39.8 knots. To overcome the sharks patrol boats were employed and to reduce the injuries, crash helmets were made compulsory, body protection suits used, and paramedics, doctors and nurses were on hand at all times.

Harold told the meeting that we had some of the best sailing conditions in the world and the local volunteers, Yachting NZ, Commodore Barry Thom, Russell Coutts, and the local industry made the regatta a tremendous success.

Earl thanked our guest speaker for a most interesting talk and presented Harold with a certificate and a bottle of wine.

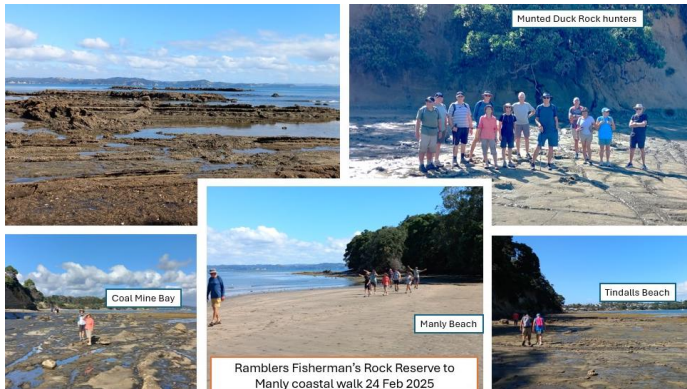
Humour

The Amblers group assembled at Manly shops outside the Manly café, for a walk down Beach Road to the beach and along the beach and back. The following week we took to the hills thanks to gentleman Jim who suggested it. We met at the picture frame in Shakespear Reserve and proceeded in clockwise direction up to the lookout, around past the Pink Beach to Te Haruhi Bay and then back to the Picture Frame.
