

### Speaker's corner



Our guest speaker was Riley Bell who spoke on the NZ Forces in France during World War 1. Being the 11th month of the year, Riley's talk started with some facts -over 100,000 New Zealanders served out of a population of 1.15 million, 5% of all military-aged men were lost which was the highest per capita of all Allied forces. Gallipoli had 2,300 New Zealanders killed and 7,500 wounded, whereas the Western Front had 16,697 killed and 41,000 wounded plus another 5,000 that died within one year after the war. Riley didn't understand why Belgium and France are barely mentioned in our ANZAC Day services.

There were 83,000 soldiers plus 3,600 horses plus equipment evacuated from Gallipoli without loss. The New Zealanders were among these and they went to Cairo before arriving in France early in 1916 joining the Five Battles of Ypres. The German army was attempting to get to the sea ports and then on to Paris, but their advance was halted at Ypres.



The First Battle of Ypres 19th October 1914 to 22nd October 1914 involved trench warfare, with 550 km of trenches dug right to the Swiss border. The Germans held the higher ground, 15 – 20 meters, which although not high definitely gave them a strategic advantage.

The New Zealanders were still in Gallipoli for the 2nd Battle of Ypres 2nd April 1915 to 25th May 1915. This involved gas and flame throwers, the success of the gas depended on which way the wind blew.

With no major movement in area gained, on the 20th September 1916 the Battle of Arras took place. The New Zealand Tunnelling Company, comprising troops from Waihi and the West Coast, dug tunnels under Arras linking into existing caves. They managed 100 meters in a day, the record, and the tunnels were big enough to hold 25,000 soldiers with equipment, running water, electric lighting, toilets, kitchens, a hospital, and a light rail system. These tunnels were named after New Zealand cities. 21 tunnels were constructed and when detonated [the shock from which was reportedly felt in England] killed over 1,000 Germans. But only 19 charges went off, the 20th exploding in 2011 thought to be activated by a lightning strike.

The 3rd Battle of Ypres, Passchendaele, 31st July 1917 to 10th November 1917 started with the Battle of Polygon Wood. The area had changed hands a number of times over the three years of the war and was finally taken by the 1st ANZAC Division in September 1917, this being regarded as a victory. Churchill made his famous quote "from the uttermost ends of the earth".

The Battle of Broodseinde 4th October 1917 followed with the 2nd ANZAC Division where they made 1,500 meters and took 1,100 prisoners with 350 killed and 1,700 wounded. This used the creeping barrage technique where the artillery

pounded the enemy and then just take a small area and hold, called bite and hold.



Finally, the Battle of Passchendaele 12th October 1917 and the 2nd ANZAC Division again, where 840 men were killed in one day along with 3,300 casualties. The rain didn't stop, there was mud everywhere and the trenches were waterlogged leading to huge loss of life. 100 years later, shells and bodies are still coming out of the ground. The bodies are buried in Caterpillar Valley with full military honours. Around Ypres there are over 100 cemeteries with 7 cemeteries for New Zealanders but a lot of soldiers were buried where they fell. Menin Gate has a list of 54,395 unknown soldiers and every evening at dusk the last post is played along with the ode to the fallen soldier. It is very emotional.

In 1922 the New Zealand Government decided to leave the missing soldiers where their mates had fallen. At Tyne Cot and the Battle of De Wallencourt there are Commonwealth graves for 12,000 names including 520 Kiwis, 320 unidentified marked with "known to God" and 1,106 missing. The original tomb of the unknown soldier is here.

A week before the end of the war, in November 1918, the New Zealanders were involved in the capture of Le Quesnoy. Use of artillery was not appropriate as there were too many civilians in the town so a smoke screen along with small and large ladders were used to gain entry. This was one week before Armistice and the last action of the war - 18 New Zealanders were killed. Four years ago, the town gave their old Mayor's Office to the New Zealand Government to be used as a New Zealand memorial and WETA Workshop has constructed a display here.

Tim Jones thanked Riley for a very informative and moving presentation, and presented Riley with a certificate and bottle of wine.

### Club speaker





Rod Klarwill started his talk telling us he was born in the Lower Hutt in 1944 and went to the Hutt Primary, Intermediate and High School along with Hal Smith. He went on to night school to do a Business Diploma.

While doing this he started a car cleaning business at 14 and joined the Territorial Army from which he received a gratuity of £50 after three years. The careers officer thought Rod was good at persuasion, so he joined the Hutt Valley Bank. After a short time, he was transferred to Head Office where he got to wear a revolver while collecting money from clients. Noting that bank staff were transferred a lot, he decided to ask a client from his car cleaning business, a traveller with a nice car, for a job. Gaining this employment, Rod ended up travelling to every electrical supplier in downtown Wellington selling electrical equipment. Transferring to Auckland, he was the travelling salesman for hardware shops throughout greater Auckland which was then expanded to Taupo and all the area north of Taupo.

In 1968 Rod decided to join IBM selling ribbons and golf balls for electric typewriters. Doing rather well, he was transferred to Wellington where he managed to gain his pilots licence. After 8 years with IBM, he left and went to Xerox. This firm had a completely different culture and was an amazing experience. Developing mini computers that sold for \$US20,000. Rod met Steve Jobs on a trip to Hawaii. Steve had left Xerox and was setting up Apple MacIntosh selling small computers for \$US1,000.

Together with his wife, Rod sailed his 43 ft yacht to Tonga and back. During this time, they decided to sell the yacht and buy a business. They ended up buying a small business in Waiuku called Rural Research in June 1987 and kept the yacht. The business developed a garden fertilizer [Nitrosol] which took off, requiring them to expand the factory by shifting to Onehunga and then to East Tamaki. The key to their success was the listening to customers.

He finally sold this business in 2011 and retired.

The following week we returned to Milldale and started from the newly discovered Juno Eatery for a stroll around the Milldale/Millwater area.
